Iconic Structure - Westfield Stratford



Benchmark Scaffolding have completed a pop up pavilion on the car park roof at the Westfield Stratford Site. The structure which overlooks the Olympic sites is to serve as a pop up evening Dining Venue.

The structure which was conceived by award winning architects Carmody Groarke, was probably one the most complex structures that Benchmark have built so far.

Ian Paxton and Graham Laffer oversaw the management and logistics of this special project and decided that they needed some extra resources as the main project remained busy and we had to complete in only a few weeks.

To achieve this end they called on the services of Barry Lane and the cobra squad. Barry took one look at the drawings and made some comments that I'm unable to repeat but ended with "if we can build this they will probably rename us the superstars"

All joking aside it was a good effort by everyone involved and a structure we can all be proud of.





Have a lovely dinner in a building site... but not just any old building site



Olympic eating HIGH DINING


You'd normally receive a swift kick to the knackers for averting your gaze from your beloved too often during a romantic dinner à deux, but that's the very purpose of Studio East Dining – a temporary rooftop restaurant overlooking London's blossoming Olympic Park. Not to leave you nursing a pair of bruised swingers, of course, but at this posh eaterie you get a bird's-eye view of the Olympic Park, the 2012 Olympic Stadium, and any builders still parading their arse cracks – sorry, working – on the building site.



Open for just three weeks (and the final day is this Sunday), the purpose-built pavilion is made from building materials pinched from the construction site but which will be returned – albeit probably covered in congealed melted cheese and

dried-up gravy splodges – once the pop-up diner is torn down.

As well as the view, there's also a decent spread to be had (think Dorset crab, roast beef and strawberries with shortbread, for example), which costs £75 per person for a set three courses, including cocktails and wine. Tap Water vs Bottled Water



In recent years the market for bottled water has grown significantly, despite bottled water costing around 500 times more than tap water. It also takes more energy to transport, which produces greenhouse gases, and is an unsustainable use of plastic or glass bottles.

Tap water is freshly on tap, 24/7. In the UK it undergoes more than 3 million quality tests a year to ensure it is safe and healthy to drink.

Tap Water Myths

Tap water is recycled from sewage

Water for drinking purposes is sourced from good quality natural under ground wells or reservoirs, lakes and rivers. Water is carefully treated to remove any contaminants that may be found in these water sources.

Tap water contains impurities

Water naturally contains dissolved minerals such as calcium, magnesium and potassium. If water contains a lot of these minerals, it is known as hard water. Hard water can result in milky or brown deposits and limescale in kettles and pipes, but this isn't harmful to your health.

Tap water doesn't taste nice

We all have preferences in the taste of tap water. Natural variations do occur, depending on its source and natural mineral content. The most common reason people think tap water doesn't taste nice is because it is normally drunk at room temperature whereas bottled water is often chilled.

Tap water tastes like chlorine

Chlorine is added to tap water to disinfect it and kill bacteria. The amount added is well within the World Health Organisation's guidelines. Chlorine residue will evaporate if you let it stand before drinking.

Tap water is unsafe

Independent tests show that UK tap water is one of the safest in the world. Contamination of tap water is extremely rare and is usually caused by localised pollution, not the water supply. Tap water is rigorously tested and the results made publicly available. Commercial bottled water companies aren't required to publish details of their quality tests.

TOP TIP: Keep a jug of tap water in the fridge, the chlorine will evaporate and it will taste better but remember to keep the water covered and replace it every 24 hours.

Ian Paxton won the London award for successfully carrying out the Heimlich manoeuvre on one of his colleagues while he was choking on some food.


May

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
Fire at the Cafe

At 13:30 on the 31st March 2010 the fire alarm was raised and the building was cleared, this time it was for real. The evacuation was controlled by Andy Wiggins (Mace Construction Manager and Fire Coordinator) and was executed extremely well. Everyone left the buildings and congregated at the muster point and all were accounted for in a matter of minutes. As for the most cherished room of the whole building it was a different matter.

The Grill Room as it was named was more than charred, it was burnt to a cinder. This room (well the fixtures and fittings at least) was all original, dating back to when the Cafe opened in 1865. They were the oldest surviving and most grandiose of all the areas of special interest lasting 145 years and surviving two world wars until now. Even though the actual building had been rebuilt in the 1930's the same layout had been situated in four different rooms. The luxurious mirrors in the Grill Room had shown the reflections of all those that frequented the place for the last time, it had all come to a very sad and disappointing end.





The Quadrant Project

In late December 2008 the clock stopped at the Café Royal for the last time, it was the end of an era. The last 143 years of entertaining high society and others had come to an end to make way for a new five star hotel.

The project forms part of the mixed-use redevelopment of the Café Royal, Regent Palace Hotel and Quadrant Arcade blocks and is the most ambitious redevelopment ever undertaken on Regent Street. It will open up the southern end of Regent Street and create a 44,000 sq m public realm area, including the establishment of a significant traffic-free area on Glasshouse Street. After Trafalgar Square, the Quadrant will represent the most significant improvement to the quality of London's public realm seen in the West End over the last 30 years.

Benchmark won the package much to the disbelief of all the other main contending scaffolding companies. With only two days to price the package, and information only given to them by the principal contractor (Mace), Gavin Mackay pulled a small miracle out of the bag and landed us two years of work. This project will keep going until December 2011 when the building is to be handed over as a five star hotel ready for the 2012 Olympic games. After some three weeks of meetings, and waiting for the Crown Estates to decide to allow us to drill in to the listed building, we were able to place our first base plates down in Air Street on the 17th September 2009. Since then we have already had over 100 lorries and vans delivering and collecting materials and we are still only at the tip of the iceberg.



Triumph truly became "the fastest motorcycle in the world" leading to the acclaimed Bonneville and the domination of the world motorcycle market until the early 1970's.
