Palace of Westminster Cast Ion the Removal to Shepley Engineers Ltd.

Benchmark Scaffolding & Hoists have just completed the first section of this project in Black Rod's gardens which amounts to about one third of the job.

The scaffold roof enclosures provide full weather protection and incorporates niko lifting rails fixed to the underside of the roofs to allow the removal of the cast iron gutters and roof tiles. The gutter sections weighing

up to 500kg and roof tiles at up to 150kg all have to be removed, transported to Shepley's Works in Cumbria where they are restored to their original condition (in some cases exact copies made), before being returned and replaced on the roof. Each gutter and tile has to be tagged so they can be replaced in their exact same location.

The scaffold which was one of the most complex we have ever undertaken is a credit to Danny McCarthy and all our operatives who have worked on this project.

Woolwich Barracks - Royal Artillery

and temporary roof structure that has encapsulated these famous barracks for the last year will be progressively removed throughout July and August. This £900k scaffolding project provided weather protection enable the replacement of the main roof trusses and slate roof covering on this historic grade II listed building. Within the barracks have also provided birdcage access using aluminium tube to minimise the loading onto the timber floors.



Bob Young, our Technical Director, has provided the design input for this job and Des McVeigh and his team (OJay Roynon, Micky Harrington, Stuart Didd, Jamie Brooks and Charlie Walker) have been present throughout; picking up numerous safety awards and a glowing audit report following a two day independent inspection. in Dorset, consisted of two new accommodation blocks for the

Royal Tank Regiment of the British Army. It took approximately four weeks for each scaffold to be erected around each block and the work was carried out by Paul Rittenberg, George Rittenberg, Alan Colyer, Dave Roberts and Steve Manby.



The scaffold at the **Cavalry Barracks in Hounslow** which covers the grade 2 listed building is 125m long by 16.5m high with spans up to 30.0m. The roof was designed using 750 haki alloy beams with additional supporting spine beams to reduce the spans at duo pitch locations.

The supporting scaffold was made using traditional fully braced 5 board wide scaffold to allow for all necessary work to the external elevations to be carried out, internally we have provided various types of access platforms with many being bridged between the walls to keep loads off the fragile floors.

We have also been involved in designing & building vertical support scaffolds to the floors & roof trusses to allow replacement or strengthening works to be carried out.

A First on the Forth

Last month we started work for Forth Crossing Bridge Constructors (FCBC), on the new Forth Road Bridge - which will be known as the Queensferry Crossing. It has been described as the biggest construction project in Scotland in a generation. On completion, it will connect Lothian (at South Queensferry) with Fife at (North Queensferry).

We had been in consultation with the main contractor for over a year with numerous design and construction proposals with Bob Young using all his experience and expertise to find a solution.

The difficulty was how to reach the foundation following a pour in order to use vibrating pokers to compact the concrete; the solution was to have a steel frame in the centre which would remain inside and act as reinforcing in the piers once completed. The scaffold had to be installed so it could be removed from bottom up following each pour. It was decided that we would have to make a centre frame to work from to fix the reinforcing bars and then have additional walkways to be lifted up each time by crane, then dismantle the scaffold below.

The team of 6 scaffolders lead by Matt Wilkinson built the scaffold bridges on land then they were transported to the cofferdams by barge, and then lifted into place which meant they had a boat trip to and from work every day. As you can see from the photographs the scaffold is now in place and the construction of the piers is well under way.

The new bridge will be a cable-stayed structure, with three towers each 207 metres (679 ft) high. Including approaches, the overall length of the bridge will be 2.7 kilometres (1.7 miles). The bridge will carry two lanes of traffic in each direction, plus hard shoulders, with the road designed to motorway standard. The new bridge will carry motor-cycles, cars and heavy goods vehicles, while public transport, cyclists and pedestrians will use the existing bridge. Wind shielding will be built into the design, to enable use of the bridge in high winds, which regularly lead to restrictions on the existing bridge.


The bridge will be the third crossing of the Forth at Queensferry, alongside the Forth Road Bridge, completed in 1964, and the Forth Bridge, a railway bridge completed in 1890.

This year one of the most important Acts of parliament to protect people in the work-place will be 40 years old. The Health & Safety at Work etc Act 1974 will be the big four oh. Its purpose was to implement the

recommendations of the Robens Committee, which reported in 1972 and concluded that the existing workplace safety legislation was over-elaborate and confusing, with about 30 Acts and 500 sets of regulations.

Robens recommended a new structure underpinned by an enabling Act setting out the basic principles of safety responsibility, thereby providing a statutory base on which all future regulations could be founded.

Before the Act, an average of 700 employees were dying at work every year and hundreds of thousands were being injured. Last year, the number of fatalities at work was down to 148 and non-fatal injuries have dropped by more than 75 per cent. Even for those who complain at excessive regulation that is a considerable achievement and, although the statistics are still too high and more needs to be done, it has served its purpose well.

Your new helmet


In response to the ever increasing safety conscious site requirements we will now be issuing all of our site operatives, who work at



Operatives will receive white helmets and managers will receive black helmets.


The CenterFit system allows the helmet to be perfectly centred on the head
